

Cervical Cancer Awareness Month

January is Cervical Cancer Awareness Month and is the opportunity become more informed. It is also the opportunity to share your knowledge about cervical cancer with others.

What is Cervical Cancer?

Cervical cancer can only be found in women with a cervix and is most often found in women under the age of 50.1,2,4,5 Cancerous tissues develop when cells of the cervix (the birth canal) become abnormal and grow out of control forming a malignant tumor.

How is Cervical Cancer Treated?

There are are essentially 3 primary treatment routes: Surgery, Drug Therapy and Radiation. 4,5 The route, variations and the way in which they are implemented will differ from person to person and will also be dependent on their health circumstances.

Who is most at risk for Cervical Cancer?

There is a long list of risk factors tied to cervical cancer, some of which include: Mother or sister with cervical cancer, personal history of cervical cancer, 3 or 4 full-term pregnancies, smoking, HPV infection, us of birth control, obesity, past chlamydia infection, infection with HIV or week immune system, and more. 5

Some statistics on Cervical Cancer:

- ✓ This year, an estimated 13,800 women in the United States will be diagnosed with invasive cervical cancer. 4
- ✓ Hispanic women and African American women are most likely to get the disease.4
- ✓ It is estimated that 4,290 deaths from the disease will occur this year. 4
