2023-24 School Description and Mission Statement

César Chávez Elementary is a K-6 school choice school that offers an alternative foreign language Spanish Immersion Program to any interested student enrolled in the Davis Joint Unified School District. In 1982 the Spanish Immersion program opened with a kindergarten/first grade combination class; today 494 students are enrolled on our campus. The students are "immersed" in a second language, by receiving academic instruction in Spanish. Acquisition of the language is a natural outcome of listening to and speaking the language while gaining academic skills in the content curriculum areas. Our program's mission is to develop socially responsible lifelong learners who embrace multiculturalism, Spanish and English biliteracy and bilingualism. Our school plan consists of three LCAP goals that support our district's Graduate Profile initiative: 21st Century Teaching and Learning, Closing the Opportunity Gap, and Safe and Inclusive School Environment. The majority of the students enrolled in the program (94%) are English-only students. About 6% of the total population of students are Multilingual Learners. We believe that our Spanish Immersion program offers students the opportunity to learn a second language while they are developing their first language. The academic curriculum offered to students in our program follows the state guidelines and parallels that of the other elementary schools in the district. The Spanish Immersion program delivers the curriculum in Spanish to all students enrolled in the program. The percentage of Spanish used to deliver the curriculum changes in each grade level and follows the Spanish Immersion Master Plan guidelines.

2023-24 Opportunities for Parental Involvement

Parent participation is essential to our Spanish Immersion program. Parent volunteers donate hundreds of hours volunteering in the classroom, library, Círculo de Lectura, Environmental Education Program (EEP)/Garden, Lobos Activos, and as members of the various committees and organizations. In particular, four parent groups are an integral part of our school community: the Spanish Immersion Parent and Teacher -SIPAT- (PTA), School Site Council (SSC), English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC), and our School Climate Committee. These four school committees are deeply invested in building a positive school climate and providing substantial funding to support programs that enrich our students' experiences. The SSC develops and approves our annual Comprehensive School Safety Plan (CSSP) and School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA), sets goals for our academic program, ensures that all students are challenged to learn, and allocates school improvement monies and grants from state sources. Climate Committee facilitates working groups among teachers and parents that align with DJUSD's 2017 Resolution on school projects that support our school where "We All Belong". ELAC is an excellent vehicle of communication for many of our families, the meetings are held in Spanish and English. SIPAT, our PTA organization, has changed its role in the school in the last three years. It has moved from solely providing enrichment opportunities for students to a central role on fundraising to pay for intervention programs, Social Emotional Learning (SEL) projects, Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS), Multicultural grants for teachers, and much more to support our school-wide initiatives. They also play an integral role on maintaining the Circulo de Lectura Programa that complement the reading services and offer school-wide events or Parent Engagement Nights.

2023-24 School Safety Plan

Our Comprehensive School Safety Plan (CSSP) is reviewed and revised annually to highlight opportunities for improvement and implementation in school safety overall 1) Safe Physical Environment, 2.) School Climate, and 3) Personal Characteristics of Student and Staff. The School Site Council establishes a Safety Subcommittee in the Fall who are tasked to make appropriate additions and revisions to the plan, discuss, and consult with local first responder entities in the writing and development of the CSSP. Our school advocates and emphasizes the safety of our students and staff members and review our safety emergency plans and protocols yearly. Our school organizes a Fall and Spring Safety Week for our students. We also hold regular fire, earthquake, and other drills monthly. On campus we maintain clean and safe facilities. Facilities staff also uses a scheduled preventive maintenance program to offset costly repairs in older sites. The Climate Committee parents along with our counselor and school staff work together to maintain a positive school climate. Yard supervisors and teachers supervise the playground and follow specific safety guidelines.

In addition, our school is in our fifth year of Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) implementation. PBIS is a framework for organizing systems and practices that focus on creating a positive and supportive school culture for all. PBIS is NOT a curriculum, intervention, or practice, but is a decision making framework that guides selection, integration and implementation of the best evidence-based academic and behavioral practices for improving important academic and behavior outcomes for ALL students (OSEP Center on PBIS). This three-tiered model focuses heavily on school-wide core features (Tier I), which are in place at our school and are available to all students at all times. Our school have developed a consistent system of progressive discipline that aligns with our PBIS framework that allows the teacher and the principal to work with students and parents to make sure that the necessary steps for behavior modification are in place in the school to support the student.

Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and development has been a primary focus and goal at CCE. Our staff has trained with Responsive Classroom, a research-based teaching approach that gives teachers concrete practices for promoting academic engagement, building a positive community, and teaching in a developmentally appropriate way. The school has 1-hour sessions dedicated to professional development each Wednesday for teachers/staff to attend (30 days for 1-hour each). Additionally, sites use portions of their return to school teacher work days for professional development.

professional learning that promotes DJUSD goals of 21st Century Teaching and Learning, Closing the Opportunity and Achievement Gaps, and Creating Safe and Inclusive Environments. DJUSD goals also include professional learning structures that support teaching and learning that will build student competencies identified within our Graduate Profile. These areas of focus were developed with wide-scale stakeholder input and are embedded within our Local Control Accountability Plan.

Davis Joint Unified School District uses a variety of professional learning models to engage staff in their continued growth. Built on the foundation of internal expertise and consultants from outside our district, staff have opportunities during the school year and summer to complete professional development learning episodes and time to implement best practices learned. These activities are supported by federal, state, and local funding as well as generous local parcel taxes. The professional growth occurring in Davis Joint Unified School District has a heavy emphasis on collaboration where time is reserved weekly for dedicated site-based staff collaboration in grade level or departmental teams under the direction of site administrators. Staff also has the opportunity to collaborate with grade-level/content peers. Davis Joint Unified School District also has instructional coaches that provide professional growth opportunities with model lessons, collaborative planning, and in-context learning. Examples of recent Davis Joint Unified School District professional learning include:

- District-wide Training for Universal Design for Learning (UDL) with two Professional Development days in August of 2023 and monthly site trainings with CAST.
- Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS)
- Ethnic Studies Institute to develop and support Ethnic Studies teachers, in addition to Ethnic Studies framework and curricular supports from the UC Davis History Project
- UC Davis Mathematics Project Teacher Leadership program (K-12) trained math teachers, instructional coaches, and some administration in the Common Core State Standards and progression of mathematical practices
- Secondary Summits, where DJUSD staff-led sessions in best practices and promising innovation pilots
- Yolo County Mental Health First Aid
- National Equity Project to support the DJUSD Administrative Leadership Team, students, and staff in developing capacity as equity leaders
- Mindful Schools where each site sent a team to learn mindfulness practices for school settings
- Elementary and Secondary Canvas resource pages
- K-6 formative assessment and personalized curriculum using the i-Ready Diagnostic Assessment platform
- Site developed training (TK 12) based upon needs articulated by staff, parents, and students to meet specific
 needs and goals. Sites develop professional growth with the support of outside expertise, district leadership, and
 staff
- NCI training which is nonviolent crisis intervention to address increased behavior challenges. Staff learns how to be proactive in behavioral expectations, de-escalate escalating behavior, and maintain relationships along with safety.
- District-wide professional learning for "Grading for Equity" to support equitable, transparent, and content-focused grading practices.
